Scotland Universities impacted by Covid

Scotland's universities have experienced dramatic financial reductions because of Covid-19. Revenues derive largely from student tuition and fees, and with in person classes suspended, have dropped. And Scottish universities are heavily dependent on foreign students for cash income.

As university officials have approached the Scottish Parliament for subventions, the MP's have indicated that any aid will come with a cost: political direction of the curriculum. Many have suggested no support for traditional humanist degrees, with preference given to STEM subjects. The Ancient universities like Glasgow would be hard hit, but Strathclyde would fare well, since when several long-standing institutions allied to form Strathclyde, the lead was taken by the School of Naval Architecture.

Covid-19 Disruptions

The precise disruption from Covid-19 to Scotland is not easy to detail. As in the US, dozens of small museums and venues have not opened at all. For instance, the more than century-long run of Christmas Pantomimes has been suspended, for only the 4th time in all those years.

There are restrictions on public transport, public toilets in many places have been blocked off. Schools have a higher priority on reopening over Pubs, and Bed and Breakfasts face very strict guidelines. The City of Aberdeen is being placed on an extremely strict lock-down.

Movie houses have been closed for so long, a number of Scottish municipalities have explored renting the space for jury trials, because they have adequate seating for very generous social distancing. Add to that that extremely heavy rains last November damaged considerable infrastructure.

Our National Poets: Philip Larkin

Mentioning Larkin as a Scottish poet is analogous to claiming Robert Frost — Larkin, a quintessentially English poet [1922-.1985]; loved to vacation in Scotland, and declared himself profoundly inspired and refreshed by Scotland's scenic glories.

Larkin was somewhat of an anomaly in an age when poets wrote almost uniformly from Left of Centre viewpoint. Larkin was very determinedly Right of Centre, which in the UK means he supported a strong government proclaiming the social value of order, discipline, self-control, and avoidance of stridency. His father was a cartoonish anti-Semite, but Larkin holds closer to Burns's "A Man's A Man For A'That."

Scots Names: MacDougall

This name goes back to the mist of history. MacDougalls descend from Somerled, King Of The Isles. Somerled held the whole of the West Country under fealty to Haakon, King of Norway. His sons disputed territory both with him and with each other. Somerled's older son, Dougall, obtained grant of powers over Argyll and The Isles. Bute fell into Scottish hands, and the King of Norway sent a fleet to assist Dougall in taking it back. Dougall's son Duncan was granted rule — until Norway in 1246 returned Bute to Scotland. And then the family gets complicated!


Visitation was held Saturday, March 14 in Enosburg.

St Andrew's Society of Vermont Scholarship Foundation Report

Despite daunting obstacles to completing our scholarship award process rising from Covid-19 restrictions, President Darryl Calkins wrote to every Vermont High School, and received more than 25 expressions of interest. Of these about 22 entered full applications. Our small committee read all of these via our internet connections, commented through a shared grid, and we made four academic awards of \$1000. Two Cultural Grants of \$500 were approved to people interested in improving their knowledge of Scottish culture. All awards were to females.

This year the St. Andrew's Society must nominate persons to serve on the board of the Scholarship Foundation. The Foundation is a "captive" charity organized under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c(3)). Board members are appointed by SAS at the Annual General Membership meeting, following which Foundation Board members meet separately to elect officers.

Present Foundation Board consists of Darryl Calkins (President), Patricia Smith (VP), Bruce Shields (Sec/ Treas), and Carolyn Adams, Russell Slora, and Scott Blanchard. Two members must be replaced by nominations from St. Andrew's Society at the AGM. Members may also be nominated at the option of the Pipes & Drums of St. Andrew's Society, and by the Vermont Highland Dancers Association. We have no representative of those organizations serving at present.

Annual General Membership Meeting.

Several of you have asked what became of the St Andrew's Society annual meeting. The event was planned for late March at the Elks Club in Barre. The day prior to her death, President Pauline was concerned about early indications that public gatherings would be banned, and had arranged with the Elks Club to hold our meeting in their Pub space, with no more than four persons per table, and the tables appropriately spaced. On the Monday following Pauline's funeral, Vermont entered into a near lock-down. In the confusion and dismay following, the Society did not communicate any plans. This newsletter, with no hint of Pauline's demise, reached your mailboxes about the same day she died.

The rest of the year has been cancelled.

- Annual General Meeting was cancelled by the State Lockdown. The Board of Managers has met via Zoom to propose a replacement AGM meeting for Saturday, Sept. 12. As things stand, that will need to be in part via Zoom. We need to elect officers: Tom Kirkpatrick is serving as President. We need to elect a President if that is Tom, we then need a Vice President. Kathy Maillie stepped in supposedly to be temporary Secretary 4 years ago, and would appreciate being replaced. The Managers did not name a nominating committee: we are to have a Zoom meeting again to settle some of these details.
- Kay Shields has agreed to again audit the books of the Society, but the day has not been set.
- The SAS Scholarship Foundation needs two board members nominated: Each year two names are proposed by the AGM, but in this year two incumbents have been absent. One former officer has volunteered to return to the board, so at least one new name is needed. And possibly on the same day as the SAS AGM, the Foundation needs to meet to reorganize and accept the new nominees.
- Kirking o' the Tartan was cancelled, because the date fell during the strict shut down. We were unable to get the word out.
 - Quechee was either cancelled or never organized. We are no longer regularly informed.
 - NH Games at Loon was cancelled.
- Tartan Ball November 7, 2020, canceled. The Canadian border seems likely to remain closed.
- Website. Past President David Campbell was our dedicated webmaster. He also owned the site. He passed from among us a year ago. Several of the Managers are experimenting with creating a new website but the situation is that no good information has been posted on the SAS website for nearly two years. Contact Cedric if you are able to help
- Facebook. Two pages show. Friends who like St. Andrews Society was an experimental page owned by Bruce Shields. It should probably be dismantled. Brett McLay built a St. Andrew's Society page. Go onto FaceBook, like it and follow it. We'll try to keep it more nearly up to date.
- Burns Nicht. We hope to have clear guidance. At this point, it might happen, but with State and National leadership holding two updates per week, we are very uncertain.

We will try to appear more organized — this year has left us stound. [Scots for knocked silly]
